NOTICE is hereby given that the **Thirtieth Annual General Meeting** of the Members of **Roopshri Resorts Limited** will be held on **Tuesday, September 29, 2020** at **4:30 P.M.** at 725, P.J. Towers, Dalal Street, Fort, Mumbai - 400001 to transact the following business:

ORDINARY BUSINESS:

- 1) To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the company for the financial year ended March 31, 2020 and the Reports of the Board of Directors and Auditors thereon.
- 2) To appoint Mr. Shreyas Shah, (DIN: 01835575) who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment.

NOTES:

1. **The AGM will be held at the said venue by strictly adhering to the Social Distancing Norms and Other Safety Protocols including face masks, hand sanitization etc. as per the latest guidelines / advisories /SOP's issued by the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India and the State Govt. amid COVID-19 Pandemic.**
2. **In consonance with the MCA circulars and the SEBI circular dated May 12, 2020, in view of COVID-19 Pandemic, the notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report for the financial year 2019-20 is being sent only through electronic mode to those members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company/Depositories, unless any Member has requested for a physical copy of the same.**
3. **Members may note that the said Notice and the Annual Report will also be available on the Company's website www.roopshriresorts.co.in and on the website of the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) www.bseindia.com**
4. **Details of directors to be appointed/re-appointed have been annexed to this notice as 'Annexure – A'.**
5. **Subject to the amendment stated in The Companies Amendment Act, 2017 read with Notification S.O. 1833(E) dated 8th May 2018 deleting the provision of annual ratification of the appointment of auditor, the requirement to place the matter relating to appointment of Auditors for ratification by members at every Annual General Meeting is done away with and no resolution has been proposed for the same.**
6. This Notice is being to members of the Company as appearing in Register of Members.
7. **A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (AGM) IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY TO ATTEND AND VOTE INSTEAD OF HIMSELF AND THE PROXY NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY. THE INSTRUMENT APPOINTING PROXY, IN ORDER TO BE EFFECTIVE, MUST BE DEPOSITED AT THE COMPANY'S REGISTERED OFFICE, DULY COMPLETED AND SIGNED, NOT LESS THAN FORTYEIGHT HOURS BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE MEETING. PROXIES SUBMITTED ON BEHALF OF LIMITED COMPANIES, SOCIETIES, ETC., MUST BE SUPPORTED BY APPROPRIATE RESOLUTIONS / AUTHORITY, AS APPLICABLE. A PERSON CAN ACT AS PROXY ON BEHALF OF MEMBERS NOT EXCEEDING FIFTY (50) AND HOLDING IN THE AGGREGATE NOT MORE THAN 10% OF THE TOTAL SHARE CAPITAL OF THE COMPANY. IN CASE A PROXY IS PROPOSED TO BE APPOINTED BY A MEMBER HOLDING MORE THAN 10% OF TOTAL SHARE CAPITAL OF THE COMPANY CARRYING VOTING RIGHTS, THEN SUCH PROXY SHALL NOT ACT AS A PROXY FOR ANY OTHER PERSON OR SHAREHOLDER. THE BLANK PROXY FORM IS ENCLOSED.**
8. Members/Proxy holder/Authorised Representative are requested to bring duly filled Attendance Slip enclosed herewith along with their copy of the Notice to attend the Meeting.
9. In case of joint holders attending the Meeting, the first holder as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote.
10. Corporate Members are requested to send a duly certified copy of the Board Resolution on info@roopshriresorts.co.in authorizing their representative(s) to attend and vote on their behalf at the Meeting
11. Relevant documents referred to in the Notice, statutory registers and the Statement pursuant to Section 102(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 will be available for inspection by the members at the Registered Office of the Company during

normal business hours on working days. Members desiring to seek information with respect to the businesses in this notice are requested to send their queries at least Seven days before the date of the meeting so that the information can be made available at the meeting.

12. A route map showing directions to reach the venue of the meeting is given in this Notice.
13. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by the member, the member shall not allowed to change it subsequently. Further, members who have casted their vote electronically shall not vote by way of poll, if held at the meeting. To provide an opportunity to vote at the meeting to the shareholders, who have not exercised the remote e-voting facility, shall be provided ballot papers before the commencement of the meeting. Any person who is not a member as on the cut-off date should treat this notice for information purpose only.
14. Member holding shares in electronic form are requested to intimate immediately any change in their address or bank mandates to their Depository Participants with whom they are maintaining their Demat Accounts. Members holding shares in physical form are requested to advise any change in their address or bank mandates immediately to the Company / RTA viz. Bigshare Service Private Limited.
15. SEBI has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form, are therefore, requested to submit their PAN to their Depository Participants with whom they maintain their Demat Accounts. Members holding shares in physical form and submit their PAN to the Company / RTA viz. Bigshare Services Private Limited.
16. As per the green initiative taken by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the shareholders are advised to register their e-mail Ids by sending written request to our RTA M/s Bigshare Services Pvt. Ltd. in respect of shares held in physical form and with the concerned Depository Participant in respect of shares held in Demat form to enable the Company to serve them documents / all communications including Annual Reports, Notices, circulars etc. in electronic form.
17. The Register of Members and Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Wednesday, September 23, 2020 to Tuesday, September 29, 2020 (both days inclusive).
18. **Voting through electronic means**

1. In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013, Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 as amended by the Companies (Management and Administration) Amendment Rules, 2015 and Regulation 44 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (Listing Regulations), the Company is pleased to provide members facility to exercise their right to vote on resolutions proposed to be considered at Annual General Meeting by electronic means and the business may be transacted through e-Voting Services. The facility of casting the votes by the members using an electronic voting system from a place other than venue of the Annual General Meeting (“remote e-voting”) will be provided by National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL).
2. The facility for voting through ballot paper shall be made available at the AGM and the members attending the meeting who have not cast their vote by remote e-voting shall be able to exercise their right at the meeting through ballot paper.
3. The members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may also attend the AGM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.
4. The remote e-voting period commences on **Friday, September 25, 2020 (9:00 A.M.)** and ends on **Monday, September 28, 2020 (5:00 P.M.)**. During this period members’ of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date of **Tuesday, September 22, 2020**, may cast their vote by remote e-voting. The remote e-voting module shall be disabled by NSDL for voting thereafter. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by the member, the member shall not be allowed to change it subsequently.
5. The voting rights of members shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date of **Tuesday, September 22, 2020**
6. Any person, who acquires shares of the Company and become member of the Company after dispatch of the notice and holding shares as of the cut-off date i.e. **Tuesday, September 22, 2020**, may obtain the login ID and password by sending a request at evoting@nsdl.co.in.

7. How do I vote electronically using NSDL e-Voting system?

Step 2 : Cast your vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system.

How to Log-in to NSDL e-Voting website?

2. Once the home page of e-Voting system is launched, click on the icon “Login” which is available under ‘Shareholders’ section.
3. A new screen will open. You will have to enter your User ID, your Password and a Verification Code as shown on the screen.
Alternatively, if you are registered for NSDL eservices i.e. IDEAS, you can log-in at <https://eservices.nsdl.com/> with your existing IDEAS login. Once you log-in to NSDL eservices after using your log-in credentials, click on e-Voting and you can proceed to Step 2 i.e. Cast your vote electronically.

6. If you are unable to retrieve or have not received the “ Initial password” or have forgotten your

 - c) If you are still unable to get the password by aforesaid two options, you can send a request at evoting@nsdl.co.in mentioning your demat account number/folio number, your PAN, your name and your registered address.
7. After entering your password, tick on Agree to “Terms and Conditions” by selecting on the check box.
 8. Now, you will have to click on “Login” button.
 9. After you click on the “Login” button, Home page of e-Voting will open.

Details on Step 2 is given below:

How to cast your vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system?

1. After successful login at Step 1, you will be able to see the Home page of e-Voting. Click on e-Voting. Then, click on Active Voting Cycles.
2. After click on Active Voting Cycles, you will be able to see all the companies “EVEN” in which you are holding shares and whose voting cycle is in active status.
3. Select “EVEN” of company for which you wish to cast your vote.
4. Now you are ready for e-Voting as the Voting page opens.
5. Cast your vote by selecting appropriate options i.e. assent or dissent, verify/modify the number of shares for which you wish to cast your vote and click on “Submit” and also “Confirm” when prompted.
6. Upon confirmation, the message “Vote cast successfully” will be displayed.
7. You can also take the printout of the votes cast by you by clicking on the print option on the confirmation page.
8. Once you confirm your vote on the resolution, you will not be allowed to modify your vote.

7. Institutional shareholders (i.e. other than individuals, HUF, NRI etc.) are required to send scanned copy (PDF/JPG Format) of the relevant Board Resolution/ Authority letter etc. with attested specimen signature of the duly authorized signatory(ies) who are authorized to vote, to the Scrutinizer by e-mail to info@jngandco.in with a copy marked to evoting@nsdl.co.in.
8. It is strongly recommended not to share your password with any other person and take utmost care to keep your password confidential. Login to the e-voting website will be disabled upon five unsuccessful attempts to key in the correct password. In such an event, you will need to go through the “Forgot User Details/Password?” or “Physical User Reset Password?” option available on www.evoting.nsdl.com to reset the password.
9. In case of any queries, you may refer the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) for Shareholders and e-voting user manual for Shareholders available at the download section of www.evoting.nsdl.com or call on toll free no.: 1800-222-990 or send a request at evoting@nsdl.co.in
10. A person, whose name is recorded in the register of members or in the register of beneficial owners maintained by the depositories as on the cut-off date only shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote e-voting as well as voting at the AGM through ballot paper.
11. Mr. Jigarkumar Gandhi, Practicing Company Secretary (Membership No. F7569) has been appointed for as the Scrutinizer for providing facility to the members of the Company to scrutinize the voting and remote e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
12. The Chairman shall, at the AGM, at the end of discussion on the resolutions on which voting is to be held, allow voting with the assistance of scrutinizer, by use of “Ballot Paper” for all those members who are present at the AGM but have not cast their votes by availing the remote e-voting facility.
13. The Scrutinizer shall after the conclusion of voting at the general meeting, will first count the votes cast at the meeting and thereafter unblock the votes cast through remote e-voting in the presence of at least two witnesses not in the employment of the Company and shall make, not later than three days of the conclusion of the AGM, a consolidated scrutinizer’s report of the total votes cast in favour or against, if any, to the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing, who shall countersign the same and declare the result of the voting forthwith.

14. The results declared along with the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company www.roopshriresorts.co.in and on the website of NSDL immediately after the declaration of result by the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. The results shall also be immediately forwarded to the BSE Limited, Mumbai.
15. As per regulation 40 of SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from April 1, 2019, except for transmission or transposition of securities. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with the physical shares members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings into dematerialized form. Members can contact Company or Company's Registrar and Transfer Agents of the Company for any support in this regard.
16. Members holding shares in physical mode are required to submit their Permanent Account Number (PAN) and bank account details to the Company / Bigshare, if not registered with the Company as mandated by SEBI.

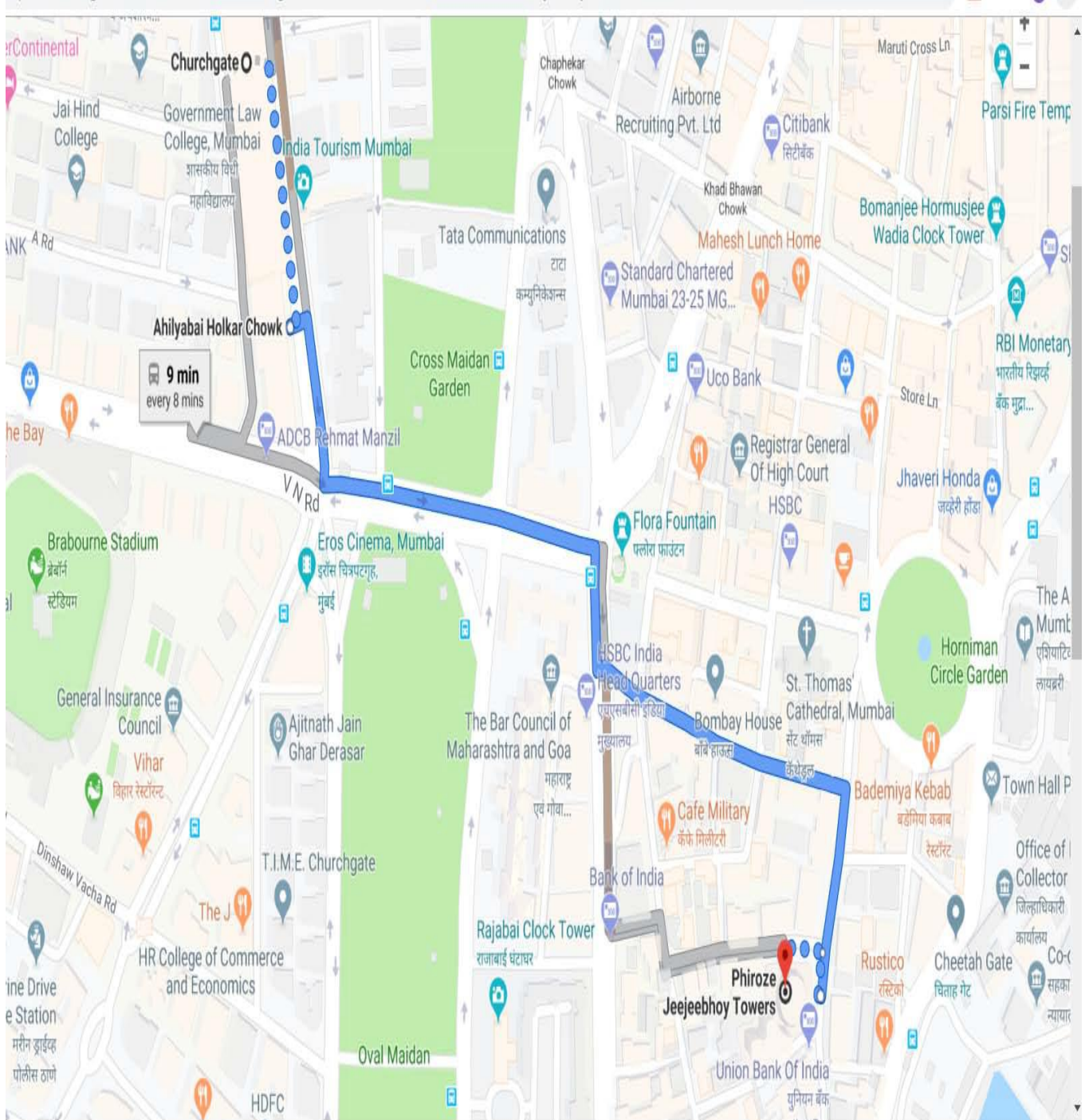

Your Directors take pleasure in presenting their Thirteenth Annual Report on the Business and Operations of the Company and the Accounts for the Financial Year ended 31st March, 2020 (period under review).

iii. Retirement by Rotation of the Directors

In accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Articles of Association of the Company, Mr. Shreyas Shah, Executive Director of the Company, retires by rotation and offers himself for re- appointment.

iv. Independent Directors

Independent Directors have provided their confirmation, that they meet the criteria of independence as provided in sub-section (6) of Section 149 of the Companies Act, 2013.

An Independent Director shall hold office for a term up to five consecutive years on the Board of a Company, but shall be eligible for reappointment for next five years on passing of a special resolution by the Company.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

I. INDUSTRY STRUCTURE, DEVELOPMENTS :

The Global Economy – Performance & Prospects:

In Year 2019, global economic growth slow to 2.9% compared with 3.6% in the previous year, impacted by slowing rates of growth in most regions across the world. In Emerging Markets and Developing Economies (EMDE), GDP growth reduced from 4.5% in 2018 to an estimated 3.7% in 2019 due to increased Government debt and a slowing of investment. Simultaneously, weaker exports and investment in advanced economies (USA, EU and Japan), led to a slower GDP growth of 1.7% in 2019 against 2.2% in 2018.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has brought global economic activity to almost a standstill. Owing to wide scale lockdowns in most parts of Asia, Europe and in South and North America, the service sector, particularly travel, tourism and hospitality have seen severe disruption to their businesses. With businesses staring at severe liquidity crisis, unemployment rates have risen sharply. Likewise, sharp drops in consumer spending have affected global supply chains. Governments across the world have introduced stimulus packages to support their economies which will further exasperate their fiscal deficits. There are varying opinions on the shape and the scale of economic recovery with the outlook still uncertain till a vaccine or an effective treatment for COVID-19 is found. The International Monetary Fund estimates the global economy to contract sharply by 4.9% in 2020, much worse than during the 2008–09 financial crisis. The U.S. economy is projected to shrink in 2020 by 5.9% and the Euro area by 7.5%. China is expected to grow at a modest 1.2%.

1. MACRO REVIEW:

Tourism is a major engine of economic growth and an important source of employment & foreign exchange earnings in many countries including India. It has great capacity to create large scale employment of diverse kind – from the most specialized to the unskilled and hence can play a major role in creation of additional employment opportunities. It can also play an important role in achieving growth with equity and sustainability.

Managing and selling services to individuals without negotiating on quality is a challenging issue. Bearing in mind the challenging issue of technology and globalization, it has become imperative for the Hospitality Industry to handle operations, marketing and human resources in an effective way. Hospitality Industry is accountable for employing individuals worldwide through Tourism. Tourism is one of the key segments that provide revenue to a state.

Roopshri Resorts Limited which is currently operating “Hotel Alexander” at Matheran, which is a popular hill station in Maharashtra. Hotel Alexander is one of the oldest hotel properties in Matheran and has been in existence operating under this brand for over 3 decades. The property is located in a secluded hill side and is ideal for getting away from the city’s hustle and bustle.

Our company has been operating as a service provider for this Hotel over the years and thereafter took the hotel property on leave and license from its owner. The Hotel had not been operating to full capacity due to poor condition of the hotel facilities and hence our company conducted restoration and repairs work and shall be making the Hotel fully operational and increase its scale of operations

The Hotel comprises of 13 private cottage rooms and 12 executive rooms, of which only 4 private cottage rooms are in operational condition. Further the hotel is currently only offering lodging facilities. Our company is proposing to renovate this property and increase its operational capacity and also rebuild its boarding facilities to be able to offer “full lodging and boarding facilities” to its customers. The look and feel of the property is of “heritage living with nature” and does not require large amounts of investment w.r.t state of the art interiors etc. This makes this a value for money proposition.

2. INVESTMENTS:

The tourism and hospitality sector is among the top 10 sectors in India to attract the highest Foreign Direct Investment (FDI). During the period April 2000-December 2017, the hotel and tourism sector attracted around US\$ 10.90 billion of FDI, according to the data released by Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion (DIPP).

3. GOVERNMENT INITIATIVES :

The Indian Government has realised the country's potential in the tourism industry and has taken several steps to make India a global tourism hub.

Some of the major initiatives planned by the Government of India to boost the tourism and hospitality sector of India are as follows:

- Ministry of Tourism launched DekhoApnaDesh webinar series to provide information on many destinations and sheer depth and expanse on the culture and heritage of India.
- Ministry of Tourism launched Audio Guide facility App called Audio Odigos for 12 sites in India (including iconic sites).
- Prime Minister, Mr Narendra Modi urged people to visit 15 domestic tourist destinations in India by 2022.
- Statue of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, also known as 'Statue of Unity', was inaugurated in October 2018. It is the highest standing statue in the world at a height of 182 metre. It is expected to boost the tourism sector in the country and put it on the world tourism map.
- Under Budget 2020-21, the Government of India has allotted Rs 1,200 crore (US\$ 171.70 million) for development of tourist circuits under Swadesh Darshan for eight Northeast states.
- Under Budget 2020-21, the Government of India has allotted Rs 207.55 crore (US\$ 29.70 million) for development of tourist circuits under PRASHAD scheme.
- In 2019, Government reduced GST on hotel rooms with tariffs of Rs 1,001 (US\$ 14.32) to Rs 7,500 (US\$ 107.31) per night to 12 per cent and those above Rs 7,501 (US\$ 107.32) to 18 per cent to increase India's competitiveness as a tourism destination.

4. ACHIEVEMENTS:

Following are the achievements of the Government during 2019-20:

1. During 2019-20, an additional fund Rs 1,854.67 crore (US\$ 269.22 million) was sanctioned for new projects under the Swadesh Darshan scheme.
2. Ministry of Tourism sanctioned 18 projects covering all the North Eastern States for Rs 1,456 crore (US\$ 211.35 million) to develop and promote of tourism in the region under Swadesh Darshan and PRASHAD schemes.
3. Statue of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, also known as 'State of Unity', was inaugurated in October 2018 and the total revenue generated till November 2019 stood at Rs 82.51 crore (US\$ 11.81 million).

5. INDIAN HOSPITALITY AND TOURISM INDUSTRY

India has been recognized as a destination for spiritual tourism for domestic and international tourists. In his Independence speech from Red Fort, Prime Minister Narendra Modi urged people to visit 15 domestic tourist destinations in India by 2022 to promote tourism. India ranked 34 in the Travel & Tourism Competitiveness Report 2019 published by the World Economic Forum.

Total contribution by travel and tourism sector to India's GDP is expected to increase from Rs .24 lakh crore (US\$ 234.03 billion) in 2017 to Rs 32.05 lakh crore (US\$ 492.21 billion) in 2028. Total earning from the sector in India is targeted to reach US\$ 50 billion by 2022. As of 2019, 4.2 crore jobs were created in the tourism sector in India, which was 8.1 per cent of the total employment in the country. International Tourists arrival is expected to reach 30.5 billion by 2028. e-Visa facility was offered to 169 countries as of December 2019. During 2019, foreign tourist arrivals (FTAs) in India stood at 10.89 million, achieving a growth rate of 3.20 per cent y-o-y. During 2019, FEEs from tourism increased 4.8 per cent y-o-y to Rs 1,94,881 crore (US\$ 29.96 billion). In 2019, arrivals through e-Tourist Visa increased by 23.6 per cent y-o-y to 2.9 million.

Under the Swadesh Darshan scheme, 77 projects have been sanctioned of worth Rs 6,035.70 crore (US\$ 863.60 million). In Union Budget 2020-21, the Government has allotted Rs 1,200 crore (US\$ 171.70 million) for the development of tourist circuits under Swadesh Darshan for Northeast.

The launch of several branding and marketing initiatives by the Government of India such as 'Incredible India!' and 'Athiti Devo Bhava' has provided a focused impetus to growth. The Indian Government has also released a fresh category of visa - the medical visa or M-visa, to encourage medical tourism in the country. In October 2018, Statue of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, also known as 'Statue of Unity', was inaugurated as a tourist attraction. It is the tallest statue in the World standing at a height of 182 metres. It is expected to boost the tourism sector in the country and put India on the world tourism map. In February 2019, the visiting hours were increased by additional two hours and the place was equipped with E-bike tours. Over 29 lakh tourists visited the Statue of Unity since it was inaugurated, resulting in a revenue of Rs 82.51 crore (US\$ 11.81 million).

The Government is also making serious efforts to boost investment in the tourism sector. In the hotel and tourism sector, 100 per cent FDI (Foreign Direct Investment) is allowed through the automatic route. A five-year tax holiday has been offered for 2-, 3- and 4-star category hotels located around UNESCO World Heritage sites (except Delhi and Mumbai).

Hotel and Tourism sector received cumulative FDI inflow of US\$ 15.28 billion between April 2000 and March 2020.

In Union Budget 2019-20, the Government introduced a Tax Refund for Tourists (TRT) scheme in line with countries like Singapore to encourage tourists to spend more in India and boost tourism. The Government of India also announced to develop 17 iconic tourist sites in India into world-class destinations as per Union Budget 2019-20.

6. INDUSTRY MEGATRENDS:

The hospitality industry has been undergoing tremendous changes and disruptions over the last two decades. The key trends that are reshaping the industry are listed here:

Virtual communities across social networks like Trip Advisor and Google, among others influence tourists and lead to more transparency

Online Travel Agents (OTAs) have altered distribution channels, facilitated a shift towards large brands and have built enduring relations with travelers

Digitalized guest experiences through apps are increasingly helping hoteliers manage many aspects of the guest cycle and experience

Booming global tourism, owing to enablers like low-cost carriers and healthy GDP growth in emerging markets.

Rising trend of experience economy wherein customers request extreme personalisation, unique experiences, and so on.

7. TOURISM & HOSPITALITY - TRENDS AND OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS FOR GROWTH :

The past decade saw a substantial increase in hotel rooms in India and with a corresponding increase in demand, room rates and occupancies improving gradually till reaching a peak in 2018-19. The impact of COVID-19 on the hospitality sector is likely to constrain supply in the near term, which is expected to trigger growth in occupancy levels and rates once consumer and business confidence returns post this crisis. India's tourism sector was, not long ago, projected to reach US\$95.3 billion by 2028. Given the current circumstances, it may however be early to assess the possible impact of COVID-19 on future capital investments in the sector and whether the projection that are under planning or in the initial stages of development will still be developed.

We believe that with the demographic of the country, the vast and widespread tourism landscape, forts and palaces, wellness retreats, wildlife sanctuaries, tea and coffee plantations, hill stations, deserts and seas, the cultural, religious and spiritual destinations which makes India a nation so rich and diverse, the opportunity for hospitality and tourism to flourish and drive employment and foster economic growth will help overcome any short and medium term impediments.

Changing customer demands: This is no surprise. Technology has made us impatient and we want things in a jiffy. The hotel industry is still Technology averse to an extent. Being somewhat technology averse can be one of the major hotel industry challenges in the coming years. Energy management: A lot of Hotels are going green and smoke-free. This is a great initiative as the planet fights against global warming and other climate related issues. However, it is also a smart move to get more profits and an edge over the competition. Establishments that refuse to take issues of sustainability seriously have been impacted negatively as the overall profit margin has suffered. Seasonality Trend: The Indian hotel industry reflects a clear seasonality trend. For eg in India, the tourism and hospitality industry shows signs of an uptrend in the months of November to February due to higher tourist flows. The months of June to September on the other hand are months of low occupancies and revenue, with fewer business or leisure visitors.

II. INDIA'S GDP AND COVID-19 IMPACT :

India's GDP growth rate declined from 6.1% in 2018-19 to an estimated 4.2% in 2019-20. On the other hand, India improved its global ranking in the *World Bank's Ease of Doing Business Report* from 143 in 2016-17 to 68 in 2019-20. **India's total foreign exchange (Forex) reserves** increased to around US\$ 508 billion in June 2020. The Government of India has introduced several bold pro-corporate initiatives in the past year, including passing of the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (Second Amendment) Bill, rationalization of GST rates and reduction of corporate tax rates. Measures have also been taken to improve the Ease of Doing Business index, reduction of GST on hotel rooms with tariffs of ` 1,001 to ` 7,500 per night to 12% and those above ` 7,501 to 18%. Likewise, easing of credit, especially for the stressed real estate and NBFC sectors helped boosting investment and consumption. Total contribution by travel and tourism sector to India's GDP is expected to increase from Rs 15.24 trillion (US\$ 234.03 billion) in 2017 to Rs 32.05 trillion (US\$ 492.21 billion) in 2028. India ranked 7th among 184 countries in terms of travel & tourism's total contribution to GDP in 2017. Travel and tourism is the third largest foreign exchange earner (FEE) for India.

Much like the rest of the world, the Indian economy has been deeply affected by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic with it's far reaching consequences on economic and social life. The lockdown in India that was imposed on 24th March 2020 has had an unprecedented impact on the economy owing to a steep fall in demand as well as supply. The process of lifting of the lockdown in various states has since started in phases, effective 1st June 2020, guided by the decision of individual states, although during a major part of this lockdown period, hotel and flight operations were mandated to remain non-operational across India. We expect domestic travel to gradually pick up as the lockdown in various cities in India is lifted. Further, once border restrictions are lifted, we expect international travel to also progressively resume. The IMF has projected India's economy to contract by 4.5% in 2020 followed by a 6.5% GDP growth in 2021-22, implying that a recovery of business sentiment and resultant economic growth recovery may be on the cards once a vaccine and/or treatment is in sight

III. BUSINESS PERFORMANCE:

The significant trends that drive the hotel industry are the opportunities for growth into new markets. Hospitality industry is undergoing a period of unprecedented change and becoming more a real estate play and will continue to transform. This is also a period of unparalleled opportunity and the need of the hour is to remain at the forefront of understanding the travellers need and demand, both now and into the future.

1. FINANCIAL AND OPERATING PERFORMANCE:

The Total Income of the Company stood at Rs. 31.96 lakhs for the year ended March 31, 2020 as against Rs. 7.75 lakhs in the previous year. The Company made a net profit (after tax) of Rs. 1.06 lakhs for the year ended March 31, 2020 as compared to the net loss of Rs. (4.56) lakhs in the previous year.

The Company and the Hotels have taken various initiatives to protect the Health and Safety of Guests and Employees. All precautions based on World Health Organisation Guidelines and directions of the Central and State Governments have been implemented and are being strictly adhered to.

2. RISKS AND CONCERNS:

Roopshri Resorts risk management framework consists of identification of risks, assessment of their nature, severity and potential impact, and measures to mitigate them. The Risk management framework has in place for adequate and timely reporting and monitoring. Risks are reviewed periodically and updated to reflect the business environment and change in the size and scope of the Company's operations. Hospitality industry constantly faces a pressure to meet the customer expectations in terms of quality of service and maintaining a balance between the inventory of resorts and growth of customers.

Ability to consistently attract, retain and motivate managerial talent and other skilled personnel, especially in a high growth industry with unique characteristics. The hotel industry may be adversely affected by changes in national or local economic conditions and other local market conditions. Changes in governmental regulations which influence or determine wages, workers' union activities, increase in land acquisition prices or construction costs, changes in interest rates, the availability of financing for operating or capital needs, and changes in real estate tax rates and other current operating expenses have an adverse effect on our business, results of operations, ability to develop new projects and the attainment of our strategic goals.

3. INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY:

Adequate internal control systems exist in terms of financial reporting, efficiency of operations and compliances with various rules, regulations etc, covering all operational departments. The Internal Auditor reviews the internal control procedures and its implementation on a regular basis and submits monthly reports. Corrective action is taken for any weaknesses that may be reported by the Internal Auditor. In order to enhance the control system further, each department has to justify the variances and discrepancies. The Audit Committee of the Board oversees the adequacy of the internal control procedures, monitors the implementation of internal audit recommendations through the compliance reports submitted to them.

4. HUMAN RESOURCES:

The Company's mission is to achieve and sustain leadership in the Hospitality industry and to deliver value to its customers by rewarding and recognizing quality customer care based upon individual and team performance. The Company provides opportunities for continuous learning and development and abides by fair policies to ensure the well being of its employees, their family, the community and the environment.

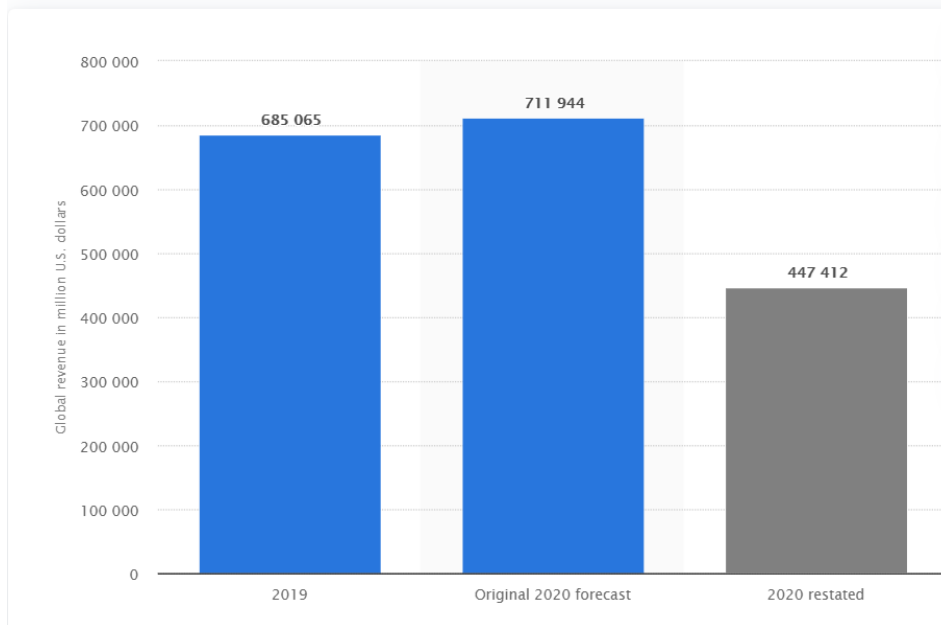
Improvements in all the areas of the hotels have been affected through:

A clear understanding of the group's vision, philosophy and flexibility in the Customer Relationship Management;

To build a culture of trust and transparency, Staff Meetings have been initiated where employees are briefed on the new activities and the business scenario and regular training imparted.

IV. OUTLOOK :

According to the Mobility Market Outlook on COVID-19, the global revenue for the travel and tourism industry will be an estimated 447.4 billion U.S. dollars in 2020 - a decrease of around 34.7 percent from the previous year. Additionally, this is significantly lower than the original 2020 forecast of around 712 billion dollars.



Overall, hoteliers need to understand what’s at stake and focus on the following five dimensions:

Standardisation can no longer be the norm: It is becoming critical to personalise and tailor services to the needs and preferences of travelers

Technology as an accelerator for business: Technology will be at the core of the hotel experience both in rooms, and before and after the trip. This will lead to the development of new concepts and more innovation in the industry

Social responsibility is an economic obligation: It is essential for governments and corporations to build real, sustainable business models for the travel and tourism industry

Develop more responsive and durable business models: Agility and resilience is very important for efficiently mitigating risks facing the industry

Manage talents actively: Attracting, developing and retaining the right talent in the hospitality industry continues to remain a core Challenge.

1. FUTURE OUTLOOK:

The Indian tourism, travel and hospitality industry is believed to have been impacted greatly. It has already seen over a quarter of accumulated losses that began from February onwards. There is no cash inflow expected for many quarters in 2020-21 as the key segments of the Indian tourism economy will be down. The international inbound tourists, inbound and VFR -- (visiting friends and relatives) and the outbound travel will remain mostly non-performing due to international flight restrictions and tragic impact in most key markets tourism markets of India. Domestic travel and corporate travel within the country may slightly ease up post lockdown but will be highly restricted due to fear of travel among elders and children, the new social distancing norms, corporate travel freeze and the closure of the holiday season which will impacting all leisure, adventure, heritage, spiritual, cruise and niche tourism segments, the statement said. Consequently, all tourism service providers, the hotels, travel agents, tour operators tourist transporters, restaurants, guides will be compromised and the tourism industry of India will be operating with extreme under capacities making most tourism businesses unviable on a cash operating basis.

Note 1:

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION:

Roopshri Resorts Ltd. (formerly known as Roopshri Resorts Private Limited) was incorporated on 09/01/1990. The Company is engaged in the business of Hotel and lodging in the vicinity of Matheran, Maharashtra.

1.1 Significant Accounting Policies:

a. Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements:

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis and in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) in India.

b. Use of Estimates and judgments:

The preparation of financial statements requires the management of the Company to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities on the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Difference between the actual results and estimates are recognised in the period in which the results are known / materialised. Though the management believes that the estimates used are prudent and reasonable, actual results could differ from these estimates.

1.2 Property, plant and equipment (PPE)

Property, plant & equipments are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use

1.2.1 Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant & equipments has been provided on the straight line method as per the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

1.3 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized in accordance with Accounting Standard 9 notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, read with rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2014.

1.4 Taxes

Tax expense comprises of current and deferred tax. Current income tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with the Income-tax Act, 1961.

Deferred Income taxes reflects the impact of current year timing differences between taxable income and accounting income for the period and reversal of timing differences of earlier years.

1.5 Earnings Per Share:

The Company reports basic and diluted earnings per share in accordance with Accounting Standard (AS) 20, Earnings per Share notified by the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006. Basic earnings per equity share are computed by dividing the net profit for the relevant period attributable to the Equity Shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during that period. Diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the net profit for the relevant period, adjusted for the effects of dilutive potential equity shares, attributable to the Equity Shareholders by the weighted average number of the equity shares and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during that period except where the results are anti-dilutive.

1.6 Employee Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are a defined contribution scheme and the contributions are recognized when the contributions to respective funds are due.

Gratuity liability is a defined benefit obligation and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation on projected unit credit method made at the end of each financial year

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents (for purposes of cash flow statement)

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits with banks. Cash equivalents are short term balances (with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of change in value.

1.8 Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

1.9 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

The Company recognizes provisions when there is present obligation as a result of past event and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources and reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. A disclosure for Contingent liabilities is made when there is a possible obligation or present obligations that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Contingent assets are neither recognised and nor disclosed in the financial statements.

1.10 Impairment of Assets

The carrying amount of assets, other than inventories is reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment, if any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the assets is estimated. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's net selling price and value in use which is determined based on the estimated future cash flow discounted to their present values. An impairment loss is recognized whenever the carrying amount of an assets or its cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount.
